## Meet the Keynote

Bernice Radle is an urban planner, activist, small-scale developer and consultant, and historic preservationist in Buffalo, New York. She owns Buffalove Development and Little Wheel Restoration Company, a full-service real estate firm focused on reviving vacant and underutilized places and spaces in Buffalo and Niagara Falls. More recently, Bernice has taken on the roles of Executive Director of Preservation Buffalo Niagara, and President of Neighborhood Evolution, an economic development consulting firm specializing in helping cities supercharge their networks of small-scale and incremental developers.

Her goal is to combine urban design, preservation, energy efficiency, and affordability to make neighborhoods better for people to live, work, and play. Her woman-owned and minority-focused companies aim for a more inclusivity for females and minorities in the real estate and construction industries. Bernice's work has been featured on HGTV and DIY network as well as in the New York Times, Huffington Post, Preservation Magazine, Strong Towns, TedX, and was awarded the Peter H. Brink Award for individual achievement by the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

Bernice holds a B.S. in Urban Planning and Regional Analysis from Buffalo State College.
